and ministerial friends; and two persons very important to us in our Bishop David recent years: San O'Connell of the Gabriel Pastoral Region; and the Pastor of Assumption Church, Franciscan Father Arturo Lopez, OFM. All ultimately has gone well.

Thanks to Father Arturo, we have resumed our use of the two room studio on the school campus of Assumption. Our teenage Ambassadors are active again, a Catholic youth group devoted to Music. The children of the now-

closed Assumption day school, who wish to remain in the touring concert choir, Escolanía Pacífica are rehearsing in the studio, weekday evenings. We are helping the Sisters maintain the campus, who use the facility for the Parish School of Religion. From time to time, the Schola will provide the parish a Festive choir of adults and youth.

We invited consider were to Immaculate Conception School. We met its dynamic principal, Heather Murphy-Garcia. Our Choirmaster, Vicente Bastidas is now teaching there. **Immaculate** Conception, an inner-city school that is also cosmopolitan, is in a quiet quarter near Downtown. At ICS we are resuming the teaching of Basic Music Skills and Choral Development, but also Instrumental Music instruction, supervised by our Classical Guitar teacher, Julio and Maldonado; related Communications and tech activities including college-type campus broadcasting and our FCC-licensed student amateur radio club, KN6GLA.

From our summer's discernment we realized we could do more, could benefit more schools, more students. More children could have Music in their elementary and middle school years, in a way that would last them all their lives, which isn't happening enough in American Education in general today.

In this edition of Quarter Notes, we are happy to announce that we are initiating, with the help of Catholic Schools Collaborative and the of local Catholic endorsement educational leaders, gateway a program of Catholic Music Education, what we are calling our Colloquium Cantorum - a musical cooperative of schools receiving parochial services of The Schola Cantorum of the Pacific®. We will teach Basic Music Skills and Sacred and Liturgical these schools Music in cooperative for regional opportunity. The more interested students from these schools can then enter our advanced ensembles functioning out of our Boyle Heights studio. We have something for each age-group - our children's touring concert choir, the

Escolanía Pacífica: our Classical Guitars and Strings; the teenage choral youth group, the Ambassadors, and for teachers interested advancing their own knowledge of music, our adult Schola Cantorum. At this writing, twelve schools are very interested. All want to implement from the earliest grades, Basic Music Skills, and then more. We hope to engage the creativity of the staffs and teachers while forming a regional Catholic music educational community.

On Sunday, January 9th at Old Mission San Fernando, a combined ensemble concert will commemorate our 45 years of Sacred Music "From Gregorian to Gospel," and the Schola's Music Education of youth. We re-enter regular activity with greater understanding, stability and promise. We will ever be thankful to all who have guided us into this all-the-brighter future.

Who knew this pandemic would have lasted as long as it has? Yet, despite the uncertainty and social Schola distancing, The managed to meet, communicate, and plan throughout the vear. Zoom and MS **Teams** became a new, regular method of communication

and productivity. Thanks to this technology, The Schola was able to continue teaching music to students through distance learning.

In particular, I was able to continue teaching classical guitar through Zoom. First, it allowed me to share the sheet music and music lessons directly on the student's screen. Then, when needed, I could demonstrate how to play a particular passage on the left hand with the camera aimed directly on the guitar's fretboard. In my opinion, it was a powerful method to teach guitar and will be a method that I will incorporate for future lessons. An added benefit is that the time saved in commuting will let me schedule more classes throughout the week, where commuting and scheduling would be difficult or impossible.

Guitar lessons will be hybrid moving forward with inperson classes on weekend mornings and several timeslots available on weekdays through Zoom. I could not be happier with our achievements and successes over the past year.
